#### CASA

With the help of the 101 Women's grant, CASA has been able to expand our in-service opportunities, offer weekly support that has enabled CASAs to be more effective in dealing with their individual cases, finding more services for their children through networking opportunities and more awareness of programs and support services for the parents and families of our CASA children. We are better able to network with fellow CASAs and obtain items needed for our CASA children and their foster families.

CASA was able to provide books to a young teen boy from a series that he likes about dragons. The young man was so happy when he was told the books were his to keep. He never owned a book before, let alone a whole series! The smile on that young man's face was amazing; one his CASA will never forget.

Three brothers were sheltered from their home and assigned to stay with grandma and grandpa. Their grandparents had a modest-sized home and were in need of bunk beds for the boys. Supervisor Jessie Sheldon worked with the Dept. of Health and Welfare, as well as Sandpoint Furniture, to secure beds and a dresser for the boys.

## NORTH IDAHO HIGH SCHOOL AEROSPACE PROGRAM

NIHSAP is reporting that a team of young women (ages 12 to 16) are building a cut-away airplane engine to be used for instruction on how an engine works and how to do basic maintenance on an engine.

These gals completely disassembled the engine and patiently cleaned and inspected every single piece, which took several weeks of Saturday work sessions.

With guidance from Ray King, a very active mentor/volunteer, the squad members learned how to assemble an engine from pieces, setting torque on bolts, precisely fitting every single piece and double-checking their work. The team finished painting their assembled engine. It has officially been named Continental Gold.

What's next? The young women have to cut one of the cylinders so it will display the piston movement, then paint and assemble the four cylinders. They are now searching for two magnetos with gears to complete the basic assembly (mags do not have to work, just fit and have gears). After that, they will mount their engine on a moveable engine stand and finish with wiring and any accessories that will be added.

None of the adult mentors did any work on the engine; rather, every bit of the work done (the wrench-turning) was done by the team members, but under Ray King's guidance.








## FINANCES AT A GLANCE
